Topping Off Ceremony at the S. Prestley and Helen Blake Ambulatory Care Center

A "topping off" ceremony was held to mark a major milestone in the construction of the S. Prestley and Helen Blake Ambulatory Care Center with the placement of the top steel beam on the project's main structure. The ceremony, held on Johnson Memorial Hospital's Enfield Campus, drew hospital leaders and colleagues, as well as benefactors and local elected officials.

The more than \$40 million dollar expansion and renovation project is designed to create a comprehensive "hub" for outpatient services on the hospital's Enfield Campus. The Blake family's gift of \$10 million launched the overall renovation of the Campus. Once completed, the S. Prestley and Helen Blake Ambulatory Care Center will deliver invaluable services and state-of-the-art care to the patients and families served by Johnson Memorial Hospital, its medical professionals, and the Trinity Health Of New England network.



Saint Mary's Hospital Renovation and Campus Beautification Initiative

The Surgical Services Suite Renovation and Expansion

project was the first phase of Saint Mary's Hospital initiative. With gifts from Woodland Anesthesiology Associates, PC, and Linda and Selim Noujaim, the project was completed in the spring of 2023.

The project has improved the patient and colleague experience and updated space that had not seen renovation in several decades. The key areas of the project included expanded and upgraded male and female staff locker rooms, three semi-private family seating areas, a private Family Consult Room, relocated Patient Registration and Reception Desk, Nourishment Station, and renovated restrooms.



Saint Mary's is restoring its history with a stained glass discovery. With a lead gift from Jim and Cathy Smith and a generous donation from Gregory and Catherine Oneglia, Saint Mary's will unveil a restored, historic, stained glass feature that will be located just off the main lobby in the One-Stop Testing area. Before Sister Dolores Lahr, former Mission Director and a Sister of Saint Joseph, left Saint Mary's for her new role as superior general of the International Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph of Chambery in Rome, she roamed the hospital for traces of her forbearers. As the last nun at the hospital, she wanted to preserve her order's history and find whatever artifacts she could. While searching every nook and cranny of the hospital, she discovered the three carefully wrapped stained glass panels, pictured at right.

Sister Dolores knew finding these panels wasn't a coincidence but an affirmation that Saint Mary's would continue the mission of the Sisters, and always be a transforming and healing presence in the lives of the

patients and families of Waterbury. She also felt the panels would deliver a message of peace and serenity for everyone, regardless of their religious beliefs. The panels were restored by Studio Pizzol Art Glass in Niantic.



Community Rallies to Support Mercy Medical Center and Honor Andy Yee

Mercy Medical Center has embarked on an important initiative to benefit the local community and honor the late Andy Yee, a local restaurateur and longtime supporter and friend to the hospital. Following his cancer diagnosis, Andy sought treatment at the Sister Caritas Cancer Center, where the Yee family developed a strong relationship with oncologist Dr. Philip Glynn. Grateful for the high quality, compassionate care Yee received until his passing in 2021, his wife, Sarah Yee approached hospital leaders about creating a space dedicated to palliative care for patients.

The Andy Yee Palliative Care Unit will be located on the fifth floor of Mercy Medical Center and will be overseen by Philip Glynn, M.D., Director, Sister Caritas Cancer Center, and Laurie Anne Loiacono, M.D., Chief of Critical Care. The Unit will be designed to provide an inviting, soothing space for end-of-life care for patients and families, as well as patients with chronic illnesses requiring pain and symptom management. It will include eight private, warmly decorated rooms, a family comfort area with a prayer room, and a family and physician consultation room.

This new unit will be a fitting tribute to a very special individual, who, during the course of his life, touched and welcomed so many. Throughout the pandemic, Andy Yee, with his business partner, Peter Picknelly, owner, Peter Pan Bus, delivered thousands of meals to Mercy colleagues as



well as to other organizations throughout the Springfield community. Their first stop was always Mercy Medical Center.

New Lillian Santilli Geriatric Wellness Pavilion at Johnson Memorial Hospital

Johnson Memorial Hospital has opened a new 15-bed geriatric wellness unit as part of efforts to expand the array of behavioral health services the hospital provides to the community. Johnson Memorial Hospital's commitment to high quality care and an exceptional patient experience are central to this state-of-

the-art healing environment for geriatric patients. A ribbon cutting ceremony and blessing were held to celebrate the opening of the newly constructed Lillian "Dolly" Santilli Geriatric Wellness Pavilion.

The acute care unit includes private and semi-private rooms with private showers. Designed to provide a "homelike" environment, the unit features "pod" style housing and community areas with large windows throughout that allow for plenty of natural light and scenic views of the rural hospital's hilltop setting. The opening



of the new geriatric wellness unit is part of Johnson Memorial Hospital's efforts to meet the needs of the local community, with an aging population that is expected to increase by 16% over the next five years. This unit will provide care to appropriate patients from throughout the Trinity Health Of New England region, including Connecticut and western Massachusetts. It also compliments the ongoing partnership with Athena Health Care Systems, which operates Evergreen Health.

Saint Francis celebrated the opening of the newly renovated Auxiliary of Saint Francis New Beginnings Maternity within the John M. Gibbons Pavilion for Women with a ribbon cutting event. Through the generosity of our donors, over \$3 million was raised for the transformation of the 4-1 unit.

The unit has a warm, homelike environment, a welcoming entrance, expanded waiting area and family-focused space, comfortable sleeping areas for family and significant others, and the Mother's Room, a dedicated breastfeeding space.

Christinat Family Donates \$100,000 to Smilow Cancer Hospital at Saint Francis



Vinny & Lynn Del Negro Way

Mercy Medical Center officials honored Vinny Del Negro, Springfield native and former NBA star, and his family for their vital and generous contributions to Brightside for Families and Children over the past 30 years. Mercy administrators, Del Negro and members of his family, and local political leaders gathered by the street leading to the hospital and unveiled its new name, Vinny & Lynn Del Negro Way.

In 1991, Del Negro established the Vinny Del Negro Endowment Fund for Brightside for Families and Children, providing financial support for the agency's program and services. Over the years, the Del Negros have stopped in Holyoke to tour the Brightside offices and meet with clinicians and staff. They have visited with children who receive services at Brightside, talking with them about their schoolwork and their plans for the future, and holding basketball clinics for them. Most recently, they sponsored the purchase of electronic devices — iPads, Chromebooks, tablets, desks and chairs, and school supplies — for children served by Brightside to assist with remote learning during the pandemic.

SBM Charitable Foundation supports Saint Francis Hospital's New Moms and Babies

The SBM Charitable Foundation generously awarded two grants over the last two years, each in the amount of \$27,000 to support the *Safe and Healthy Beginnings for East of the River Children* program, which was established at the Vernon OB Clinic during the pandemic. This program benefits low-income expectant and new mothers and their infants and toddlers. The grants included support for a Patient Navigator and a Patient Assistance fund — two enhancements which round out the services families need when bringing a baby into the world.

Starting in 2022, the new Patient Navigator has formed close connections with the mothers and has received positive accolades from all. She has helped multiple mothers from foreign countries, several mothers who gave birth to twins, and one mother who had a newborn and financial struggles of her own yet still opened her home to friends from a foreign country with newborn twins and an older child. The program is not only assisting mothers but helping them to pay it forward.

Pink Out

From cotton candy to florescent and every shade in between, Saint Mary's Hospital colleagues wore their pink with pride in recognition of the annual PINK OUT Day in October 2022.

Pink Out Day began at City Hall in the morning with a press conference. Saint Mary's Foundation Chief Development Officer Amanda Nardiello kicked off the event welcoming volunteers and thanking them for their tireless efforts on this remarkable initiative. Mayor Neil O'Leary provided remarks, as did Saint Mary's Hospital President Kim Kalajainen, breast surgeon Beth Sieling, M.D., and U.S.

Congresswoman Jahana Hayes.

Together with the Waterbury Police and Fire Departments, the Department of Education, parochial schools including Holy Cross High School, and other municipal departments, the Saint Mary's Hospital Pink Out initiative has raised more than \$50,000 in support of the Breast Screening Fund. The fund provides breast screening tests for hundreds of women annually in the Greater Waterbury area who otherwise may not have access to these procedures.

Hope Transforms

On Friday, May 19, 2023, Saint Francis Hospital oncology nurses gathered for a day of enrichment and rejuvenation. Hope Transforms: Oncology Nursing Symposium was made possible through the generosity of Nancy Grover and her support of the Smilow Cancer Hospital at Saint Francis. During her two-year journey of caring for her husband and accompanying him to the hospital, she saw first-hand the dedication and compassion of the cancer center colleagues, especially the nurses. Since the pandemic, frontline health care providers have borne the brunt of unprecedented and relentless challenges, resulting in anxiety, exhaustion, and burnout that has led many to consider leaving the profession. Still, our nurses and caregivers persevere offering patients compassionate care each day.

The symposium emerged as a pivotal opportunity for



these nurses to come together and restore their well-being. Throughout the day, attendees were treated to a lineup of insightful speakers and a keynote address centered on effective stress management techniques. The profound gratitude extended to the Grover Family for their generous support, which made this event possible, continues to resonate deeply among everyone involved.

Brightside Golf Invitational to Support Brightside for Families & Children

After a three-year hiatus due to the pandemic, the annual Brightside Golf Invitational returned to the Ranch Golf Club in Southwick in August 2022. Over \$20,000 was raised to help continue the important work of Brightside for Families

in honor of William Wagner, President of the former Chicopee

Her efforts in and outside of the boxing ring helped her raise \$55,000 to KO cancer. \$26,000 has been donated to Saint Francis's Karl J. Krapek, Sr. Comprehensive Women's Health Center. The donation will benefit the patient assistance fund and provide mammograms, ultrasounds, or other

cancer diagnostic tests to non- or under-insured patients. By expanding access to annual screening and early detection to those who would otherwise forgo preventative care due to cost, Emily wants her donation to directly benefit women within the Hartford community and their families and provide the potentially life-saving access.

Emily's grandmother and two of her aunts have each



fought their own battle against breast and ovarian cancer and their courage is what helped her step into the ring. Her grandmother, Selma Moffie, has battled breast cancer four times (and plays golf at 93 years old). Emily's two aunts, Celia Moffie and Cathy Demio, have also been fighters, teaching Emily and her cousins how to get up and fight like a girl. Emily was fighting in honor of Scout Scaravilli, her kind, strong and beautiful, cousin who

passed away, along with her sister Chasey, in a hammock accident three years ago. Scout was a boxer and always had the courage to fight for what was right and what she believed in. Scout and her sister Chasey Honor Scaravilli are missed dearly and will always be remembered for their bravery and kindness. For that reason Emily fought with love in Scout's Honor.

The tenth annual "Wicked in Pink" Motorcycle Run to benefit Mercy Medical Center's Sister Caritas Cancer Center was a tremendous success. CHEFA Grants Advance Health Equity for Our Patients

Through over \$300,000 in recent grant awards, the Connecticut Health and Educational Facilities Authority (CHEFA) is partnering with all four of our Connecticut hospitals to achieve more equitable health outcomes for our most vulnerable patients.

Significant CHEFA support over the course of two years is expanding our Department of Community Health and Well-Being's proven community health worker model into the Emergency Departments at Saint Francis, Saint Mary's, and Johnson Memorial hospitals, which often provide entry points into health care for our medically underserved community members.

Extensive research has shown that community health workers, who often live in the lower-income communities they serve, help residents access and stay connected to care. The new ED community health workers are screening patients for social influencers of health, connecting them to needed resources, and helping them follow discharge instructions and keep follow-up appointments.

In addition, two CHEFA-funded capital projects will further Community Health and Well-Being's efforts to create a healthy eating ecosystem that spans the Saint Francis and Mount Sinai Rehabilitation Hospital campuses. Providers at Saint Francis' safety net clinics soon will be able to refer patients with unmanaged chronic conditions, such as diabetes, hypertension, and congestive heart failure, to a new Food Is Medicine Program, including a "food farmacy" with medically tailored foods and dietitian, pharmacist, and community health worker services. Patients and family members also will take healthy cooking classes through a new teaching kitchen to be built on Mount Sinai's campus in North Hartford.

"CHEFA has made a significant commitment to health equity in Connecticut, providing more than \$1M in funds for this purpose in 2023. We are proud to partner with Trinity Health Of New England on these projects which will benefit our fellow Connecticut residents and communities," stated Jeanette W. Weldon, CHEFA's Executive Director.
